Seminar on Alternative Dispute Resolution and Judicial Remedy in Rape Case Held

RED, along with the Human Rights and Legal Services programme of BRAC, arranged a seminar to share the findings of two recent studies with the civil society on 26 August 2009 in Dhaka. The studies are – a) Understanding the alternative dispute resolution for the rural women in Bangladesh: some illustrations from BRAC HRLS programme by Debasish Kumar Kundu, *et al.* and b) The legal challenges on the way to judicial remedy in rape case: the role of HRLS programme of BRAC by Ms. Sharin Shajahan Naomi. Dr. Shirin Sharmin Chaudhury, State Minister for Women and Children Affairs, Government of Bangladesh attended as the chief guest while Ms. Sultana Kamal, Executive Director of Ain-O-Shalish Kendra and former advisor of the caretaker government of Bangladesh attended as special guest. Others attended the seminar include representatives of human rights NGOs, lawyers and activists, researchers, teachers, students, and journalists.

into two: specially targeted ultra poor (STUP) and other targeted ultra poor (OTUP). STUP and OTUP packages were further disaggregated into STUP 1 and 2 and OTUP 1 and 2. This study aims to develop a strategy on how to identify the eligible target groups by appropriate models reflecting heterogeneity among them. This study is based on cross-sectional data on a sample of 2700 households surveyed during September-October 2009. A draft report is expected by the end of November 2009.

Research Update on Social Development and Human Rights

Study on HRLE *Shebika* Initiated

A study on BRAC Human Rights and Legal Education *Shebika* (field worker) has been initiated to assess their socioeconomic and demographic situations, including their vulnerabilities and barriers in “protest, prevent, protect” role in the community. Data collection is in progress. A draft report is expected by March 2010.

Study on Human Rights Lawyering Begins

This study aims to compare the BRAC panel lawyers of HRLS programme and non-BRAC lawyers on the basis of selected indicators of human rights lawyering. These indicators include communication with clients, legal skills, patience to deal with clients, client empowerment, critical analysis of the duty of lawyer, etc. Data analysis is in progress. The preliminary findings will be shared in January 2010.

Study on BRAC's Popular Theatre Begins

BRAC has been staging popular theatre throughout the country since 1998. It is an innovative communication medium widely

used to raise awareness for social development. Its success primarily depends on the extent to which messages are understood by the target audience. RED has initiated a study to examine the extent to which the members of BRAC ultra poor programme and other viewers understand these messages. The study is in progress.

Evaluation of *Palli Shamaj* Initiated

BRAC's Social Development Programme has established 12,260 *Palli Shamaj* (ward-level rural civil society organizations) to help the marginalized people uplift their socioeconomic status, and become active citizens in society. This study will assess the extent to which *Palli Shamaj* are able to meet three programme objectives – a) access to government services such as VGD/VGF cards, b) participation in local government activities through voting and local decision-making, and c) participating in local social initiatives. It will also map the organization's coverage, both geographically within wards as well as in terms of its linkages with other BRAC and non-BRAC organizations, as well as the local government. The study is in progress.

Economic Research Update

Study on Targeting of the Ultra Poor for Different Models of CFPR Initiated

A study on ‘How can ultra poor be differentiated to reach with different packages of CFPR?’ has been initiated. The support packages of CFPR II are primarily divided

Early Assessment of CFPR Phase II Support Packages Completed

A draft report on ‘Early assessment of CFPR phase II support packages’ has been completed. This study provides assessments of the four packages (STUP 1 and 2 and OTUP 1 and 2) delivered by CFPR phase II. All four packages were found to have significant positive impacts on the livelihoods of the participating households although the dimensions and magnitude of impacts vary within the packages. It was found that as a result of programme participation, households experienced an increase in farm self-employment for both males and females, diversification of income sources, increase in per capita income and food expenditure, and increase in saving behaviour.

Study on BRAC *Kallyan* Project Initiated

A study on BRAC *Kallyan* Project for the retrenched workers of state-owned enterprises has been initiated. It aims to explore the differences between project participant and non-participant workers in their basic livelihoods. This study may help improve project operations and further extension of the project. A draft report is expected by the end of November 2009.

MNCH Research update

Three consultants from Aberdeen University, UK visited BRAC in March 2009 to provide

technical support to analyze baseline data of 2008 of the 'Impact Evaluation of Rural MNCH' project. The baseline report has been completed. The preliminary findings were shared with the donors and the government of Bangladesh on 18 June 2009.

Guest researchers Prof. Maigun Edhborg and Dr. Zarina Nahar Kabir of Karolinska Institute, Sweden visited RED to review, supervise and provide technical support in the data analysis of 'Maternal perinatal depression project' run in collaboration with Karolinska Institute, Sweden (2008-2011). A new study has been initiated on supply side costing (cost of providing MNCH services).

Workshops and Seminars Held

Workshop on CFPR held

RED organized a workshop entitled 'Challenging the Frontiers of Poverty Reduction (CFPR): Innovations, impact and influence' on 19 July 2009 in Dhaka to share some of the key research findings on this programme. The workshop aimed to create a larger discussion on crafting a scaled up, inclusive and forward looking social safety net strategy for the poorest in Bangladesh. The presentations include assessment of trends and policies of extreme poverty in Bangladesh, the CFPR concept, targeting approach, panel doctor model, elite support for the ultra poor, non-economic determinants of graduation, and effects of the programme in improving the lives of the ultra poor. The members of the civil society, representatives of the government, donors, and other development partners attended the workshop.

Workshop on Population Ageing Held

Workshop on 'Population ageing: integrating research and practice to improve health and quality of life of older persons' organized by the International Network on Public Health and Ageing (INOPA), Sweden was held on 29 September 2009 in Dhaka. BRAC/RED is a partner of this network and has provided management support in organizing this workshop.

Seminar on Gates Foundation Strategy Held

A seminar was given on 'Reducing hunger and poverty through agricultural development: the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation strategy' by Dr. Prabhu Pingali, Deputy Director, Agricultural Development, BMGF on 8 October 2009 at Sasakawa Auditorium, ICDDR,B, Dhaka. The seminar was organized by RED in collaboration with the Food and Agriculture Organization, Dhaka.
